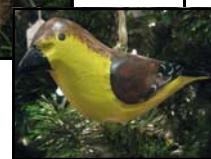
Dear Friends,

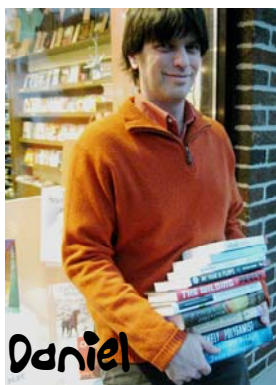

Day for Night by Frederick Reiken ~ “Interconnected storylines about manatees and leukemia and the Holocaust and sixties radicals and 1984. A joy to read - a feast for the mind and the heart.” (was \$24.99, now \$19.99)

The Lonely Polygamist by Brady Udall ~ “Golden Richards has fallen on hard times and takes a job building a brothel. That wouldn't be so bad, only he's a member of an evangelical LDS spin-off, with four wives and 28 kids. Comic and epic both, Udall's novel is one part Anne Tyler mixed with a healthy dose of Jeffrey Eugenides' *Middlesex*. I loved it.” (was \$26.95, now \$21.56)

The Invisible Bridge by Julie Orringer ~ “The tragedy of World War II Hungary is told through two brothers, one an architect, the other a doctor, in this grand novel that reminded me of Tolstoy. A magnificent world built, then torn down, but in the end, it's a story of hope and survival. Just wonderful!” (was \$26.94, now \$21.56)

The Cookbook Collector by Allegra Goodman ~ “Two sisters during the late 1990's walk different paths to fulfillment: one in big business, the other drifting through graduate school and a job at a second-hand bookstore. I loved this modern take on *Sense and Sensibility*—both insightful and delightful.” (was \$26.00, now \$20.80)

Skippy Dies by Paul Murray ~ “This darkly comic book loops through the characters of Skippy's former life, putting puzzling pieces together, or shattering them hard upon the narrative page leaving you astounded.” (was \$28.00, now \$22.40)

How to Live Safely in a Science Fictional Universe by Charles Yu ~ A razor-sharp, ridiculously

funny, and utterly touching story of a son searching for his father through quantum space-time. “This book is fantastic—time travel, paradoxes, and great family fun!!” (was \$24.00, now \$19.20)

The Countess by Rebecca Johns ~ “This re-imagining of Erszebet Bathory's life is not a story about a vampire. However, there is plenty of blood as a woman's jealousy, bitterness, and paranoia turns into a tragic obsession with violence.” (was \$25.00, now \$20.00)

Orange is the New Black by Piper Kerman ~ “A pointed commentary on a cruel and indifferent judicial system, but more than that, a story of survival through resilience, humor, compassion, and uniquely feminine grace.” (was \$25.00, now \$20.00)

Bury Your Dead by Louise Penny ~ “Haunted by a previous investigation, Armand Gamache is in Quebec City when murder finds him again. To deal with the present, he must confront the past - a painful journey that will hopefully bring peace. I loved it!” (was \$24.99, now \$19.99)

Let's Take the Long Way Home by Gail Caldwell ~ “An elegant telling of the story of Caldwell's extraordinary friendship with author Caroline Knapp. A truly inspiring book - I am so grateful I read it. It completes the story that began ten years ago when I found, and loved, Knapp's memoir, *Drinking: A Love Story*.” (was \$23.00, now \$18.40)

Using information from Alcott's letters and journals, McNeese writes the fictional story of this bittersweet romantic interlude to Alcott's mostly solitary life.” (was \$24.95, now \$19.96)

The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks by Rebecca Skloot ~ Scientists know her as HeLa, yet she was a poor Southern tobacco farmer who worked the same land as her slave ancestors. Her cells—taken without her knowledge—became one of the most important tools in medicine. (was \$26.00, now \$20.80)

The Good Man Jesus and the Scoundrel Christ by Philip Pullman ~ “Pullman gives us a whole new mythology of Christ, with new heroes, villains, and morals in this compulsively readable novel.” (was \$24.00, now \$19.20)

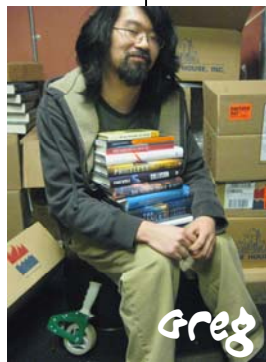
